FAIR FUNDING EVENT —Rabbi Jack Paskoff has spoken to many sessions of the International baccalaureate (IB) Comparative Religion class. The races of the students in the

class match the complexion of the city: mostly white, Latino and African American. The night of the testing dinner, though, he noticed almost all of the students there were white. Unfortunately, although the students of color qualify for the classes and work hard and do well on the exams in school, they generally don't make it to the testing phase. Why not? What would it take to support them along the way? There are a variety of factors, but for the teacher he spoke with, poverty is the leading cause. They need mentors and smaller class sizes. Forty million dollars more would be available in the SDoL if the state passed 100% implementation of the Fair Funding Act, and more kids around the county (11 of 16 school districts) would benefit. **On June 12th there is a gathering planned to let our elected officials know that this is what we need and want them to work for.** This is a matter of justice.
